John 11:1-45 Good News Translation (GNT) The Death of Lazarus

11 A man named Lazarus, who lived in Bethany, became sick. Bethany was the town where Mary and her sister Martha lived. (2 This Mary was the one who poured the perfume on the Lord's feet and wiped them with her hair; it was her brother Lazarus who was sick.) 3 The sisters sent Jesus a message: "Lord, your dear friend is sick." 4 When Jesus heard it, he said, "The final result of this sickness will not be the death of Lazarus; this has happened in order to bring glory to God, and it will be the means by which the Son of God will receive glory."

⁵ Jesus loved Martha and her sister and Lazarus. ⁶Yet when he received the news that Lazarus was sick, he stayed where he was for two more days. ⁷ Then he said to the disciples, "Let us go back to Judea."

¹⁷When Jesus arrived, he found that Lazarus had been buried four days before. ¹⁸Bethany was less than two miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁹ and many Judeans had come to see Martha and Mary to comfort them about their brother's death.

²⁰ When Martha heard that Jesus was coming, she went out to meet him, but Mary stayed in the house. ²¹ Martha said to Jesus, "If you had been here, Lord, my brother would not have died! ²² But I know that even now God will give you whatever you ask him for." ²³ "Your brother will rise to life," Jesus told her. ²⁴ "I know," she replied, "that he will rise to life on the last day."

²⁵ Jesus said to her, "I am the resurrection and the life. Those who believe in me will live, even though they die; ²⁶ and those who live and believe in me will never die. Do you believe this?" ²⁷ "Yes, Lord!" she answered. "I do believe that you are the Messiah, the Son of God, who was to come into the world."

²⁸ After Martha said this, she went back and called her sister Mary privately. "The Teacher is here," she told her, "and is asking for you." ²⁹ When Mary heard this, she got up and hurried out to meet him.

³²Mary arrived where Jesus was, and as soon as she saw him, she fell at his feet. "Lord," she said, "if you had been here, my brother would not have died!"

³³ Jesus saw her weeping, and he saw how the people with her were weeping also; his heart was touched, and he was deeply moved. ³⁴ "Where have you buried him?" he asked them. "Come and see, Lord," they answered. ³⁵ Jesus wept. ³⁶ "See how much he loved him!" the people said. ³⁷ But some of them said, "He gave sight to the blind man, didn't he? Could he not have kept Lazarus from dying?"

³⁸Deeply moved once more, Jesus went to the tomb, which was a cave with a stone placed at the entrance. ³⁹ "Take the stone away!" Jesus ordered.

Martha, the dead man's sister, answered, "There will be a bad smell, Lord. He has been buried four days!"

⁴⁰ Jesus said to her, "Didn't I tell you that you would see God's glory if you believed?" ⁴¹ They took the stone away. Jesus looked up and said, "I thank you, Father, that you listen to me. ⁴² I know that you always listen to me, but I say this for the sake of the people here, so that they will believe that you sent me." ⁴³ After he had said this, he called out in a loud voice, "Lazarus, come out!" ⁴⁴ He came out, his hands and feet wrapped in grave cloths, and with a cloth around his face. "Untie him," Jesus told them, "and let him go."

⁴⁵ Many of the people who had come to visit Mary saw what Jesus did, and they believed in him.

REFLECTIONS: by Deacon Sally Wheadon

This worship resource has been adapted for the service which is being streamed from St Helier Methodist Centre on Sunday 29th March but if you have seen a copy of the original you will know that, in place of a sermon, it advises you to read the gospel passage reflectively to see what the Holy Spirit is saying to you. Well I want to share with you today something that I felt the Holy Spirit was saying to me some years ago and although it's not directly connected with our Bible reading this morning, it does kind of fit and I feel that it is worth sharing in the present crisis.

But first, let's take a look at the reading from John's gospel because it is particularly relevant as events unfold before our very eyes, both here in our island and across the world. I come from Cornwall originally, my husband Danny and I moved to Jersey some eighteen months ago. Most of our family still live in, or very close to Cornwall and sadly there have been several deaths over there now due to the corona virus. And I was shocked when the details of the first victim emerged because when I saw his photograph, I realised that I knew him. We had mutual friends so had been at some of the same social events. I'd had conversations with him and his wife, he was a kind and gentle man.

When we lose loved ones, it's natural to question, even to be angry. Mingled with their grief, I sense some anger in Martha and Mary. When Jesus finally arrives, the first thing Martha says to him is "If you had been here, Lord, my brother would not have died!" And then when Mary appears on the scene, she repeats "Lord, if you had been here, my brother would not have died!" And we see some of the wider group also questioning: "He gave sight to the blind man, didn't he? Could he not have kept Lazarus from dying?" And when we are grieving, we do question don't we? Often people who wouldn't ordinarily claim to believe in God suddenly find themselves asking: Why did you let this happen? Where were you when I needed you? Why didn't you save them?

We know, all too painfully, that people die, and yet in sharing this account of Jesus raising Lazarus, the writer of John's gospel wants us to know that Jesus has power over life and death. Jesus says in John chapter 5 "I tell you the truth, the Son can do nothing by himself, he can do only what he sees his Father doing, because whatever the Father does the Son also does. And so we know that our Father in heaven is more powerful than death and this is demonstrated in our gospel reading today as we see Lazarus come out of the tomb after four days.

And yet, outside of the Scriptures, personally I've never seen anyone who has been dead for four days come back to life. We hear stories of people dying momentarily in an ambulance or on an operating table but I think it would be an incredibly rare occurrence for someone to return to an earthly existence after four days, if it's ever happened at all.

But I want to share with you now something of my own experience of what I felt the Holy Spirit was saying to me some twenty years ago when my uncle was dying in a hospice. He was my mother's twin brother and they were particularly close, not just because they were twins, but because both their parents died when they were relatively young. Their father died when they were teenagers and their mother died when I was a little girl. Anyway, seeing my uncle close to death and my mum distraught, I decided that I wasn't having any of it. I decided that I was going to sort it out, I was going to pray to God and demand a miracle. So I went home and lay prostrate on the floor and I bargained, begged, pleaded and demanded. And when I was finally exhausted I sat in the chair, picked up my Bible and said "Now I want proof that the miracle has happened and my uncle is healed." Then I opened the Bible randomly looking for confirmation and my eyes immediately fell on Luke Chapter 24, an account of the resurrection of Jesus. It read 'On the first day of the week, very early in the morning, the women took the spices they had prepared and

went to the tomb. They found the stone rolled away from the tomb, but when they entered, they did not find the body of the Lord Jesus." It goes on to tell us that suddenly two men in gleaming clothes appear and said to them "Why do you look for the living among the dead? He is not here; he has risen!"

Well I was amazed that the Bible had opened at this passage and then I felt the Holy Spirit saying to me "Here is the miracle you are looking for, the miracle above all miracles. But it's not just for you, and your uncle and your family, it's for all people for all time." Well, of course my uncle died a day later because he was an incredibly sick man but although I was sad, I was at peace with it. And I was at peace with it because of the miracle of the empty tomb. The empty tomb is the miracle that we need to focus on in this crisis, amidst all the suffering and grief, we have a sure and certain hope of ever lasting life.

But, in the meantime, as the death toll rises daily, let us keep in mind that when Jesus saw Mary and the people with her weeping, he was deeply moved, and he wept with them. We have a God who cares deeply about our pain and who weeps with us but who also offers us ever lasting life in a place where there is no more death or mourning or crying or pain if only we will believe it.

In this current time it's not easy 'not' to be troubled and afraid, but I urge you to cast your burdens on Jesus for he does indeed care for you and above all, I urge you to keep in focus the miracle of the empty tomb.
