Today's Reading from the New Testament Matt. 14:22-33 Jesus walks on water

And immediately Jesus drove his learners to step into a ship, to go before him to the other side, whilst Jesus set free the throngs of people. After dismissing them, he ascended into the mountain by himself to pray. The evening was coming and he was all alone.

The ship, however, was already in the middle of the sea and was being tormented and tortured by the winds which were hostile and contrary.

The fourth watch of the night, Jesus walked at large on the sea. The learner's eyes popped and were overcome by terror and fear at the phantom they could see and they cried out in their agitation.

Immediately, Jesus speaks to them saying 'Be of good cheer!' and do not be terrified!

Peter then answered Jesus and said Lord, if you are who you say you are, command me to step down into the water. Jesus said, come into this place. Peter walks on water coming towards Jesus, but then perceiving, feeling and then seeing the aggressive wind, his phobia kicked in and began to plunge into the sea, croaking, shrieking and spluttering "Lord rescue me from my destruction!" Immediately, Jesus stretching out his hand, grabbed him and said to him "you trusted too little, why did you hesitate and waiver?"

Time to Reflect:

Just keep your eyes fixed on him.

You probably didn't recognize that translation. That's because you won't have heard this one before. This is another well-known and beloved reading and when I looked at the Greek, it was too interesting not to do my own translation and hard as I try, I'm compelled to tell you about some of the fascinating Greek that's going on here.

And immediately Jesus drove his learners to step into a ship, to go before him to the other side, whilst Jesus set free the throngs of people. After dismissing them, he ascended into the mountain by himself to pray.

We're so used to hearing the word disciples, but the traditional word for disciples isn't used here, the word meaning learner or pupil is. Most translations would say Jesus made the disciples get into a boat. But the Greek uses a stronger verb to get the disciples in a ship - not a boat. This isn't just a row boat, or a small fishing vessel, this is a ship. The Greek uses a verb which means necessitate, to drive, compel, force. It's not a polite request it's more of a 'get in now before I change my mind and we won't get ice cream!' Most of you know I'm a Guide leader and I can resonate with this feeling of herding cats and trying to get a group of people to be somewhere on time.

We often think of this scene and the disciples in a little boat in the middle of the sea of Galilee and the winds pick up and it's a bit rough a ready. But the way the greek describes what's going on, it's like a horror scene from Moby Dick! The Greek uses a verb which has a dictionary definition of similar to properly.

- 1. to testing the integrity of metals by touchstone.
- by touchstone.to question by applying torture.
- 3. to torture
- universally, to vex with grievous pains (of body or mind), to torment

This poor ship, not a boat, was under massive strain and being attacked by the wind and weather, pummeled, tossed and turned; the wind and weather was out to destroy this ship.

As if the weather wasn't bad enough and many of the disciples are seasoned fisherfolk, they are grabbling against the weather to stay safe and then they see what the Greek literally describes as a 'phantom' it's the same word we have in English and related to the word phobia which comes later on in the reading.

Jesus speaks to the disciples and is quite jolly with his retort of 'be of good cheer and don't be terrified. So Peter, clearly recognizes Jesus' voice and wants to double check who this is. Which means actually poor Thomas who's known as doubting Thomas is getting a raw deal, because Peter is here doubting first...

Jesus invites Peter, not into the water, but into this place. The place where he is inhabiting. Peter comes towards him and gets distracted by everything going on around him, his phobia of dying kicks in and starts plunging into the sea, but Jesus is totally in control right now and grabs his hand and saves. The Greek doesn't say 'oh yea of little faith' it says 'you trusted too little'. Faith and trust are quite different things.

I'm fascinated by what's going on here, because the story I know so well and like you, probably grew up with, feels quite different when it's presented with a different translation. We're surrounded by the sea here in Jersey and we know it's perils and dangers so well. You're like me and probably have your favourite bay, favourite bit of beach and favourite view of the coast.

But you're also aware of the bays which are treacherous, the places where the rocks are and currents will eat you up and smash you into the cliffs. But there is a place in Jersey where you can walk on water when the tide is right. In St Helier by St Aubin's bay, you can walk around the edge of the tidal swimming pool and if you time it right, it looks like you're walking on water as the tide comes in.

But what does this passage have to do with me and you right now? What's the message? Where is the hope? Where are you in this story right now?

Maybe you're the ship. You've been strong, sturdy and reliable for so many people, serving faithfully for so long, but you're being battered around right now and you're not sure you can cope in this environment of just being attacked continuously, vexed, tortured, tested, have so much pressure on you.

Maybe you're one of the learners in the ship. You've been doing this faith stuff all your life, but for some reason at this moment in time, the ship that's carried you so faithfully all the days of your life is in peril. Doubts about where God is in the pandemic, in your family, in your work, in your - you fill in the blanks. You're doubting whether this church thing is even for you, or whether you want to go back or a revelation that vou've experienced God more during the pandemic then you ever have and 'normal' church just doesn't feel right anymore.

Maybe you're the wind. You're angry, upset, antagonistic, hostile and feel contrary to everything that's going on around. I can get in moods like that and whatever someone says I'm going to take the opposite view just to be a pain and make their life miserable. I don't do it so much now you'll be pleased to know! But if you feel like this, the Greek for what the wind is doing is probably striking a chord.

You can't think straight for the raw emotion that's swarming round you right now and you're just filled with this energy that's expressing itself in battering everything around you regardless of the consequences.

Maybe you're Peter. You've been trying to so hard and you want to be this special person, you want to do what God wants for you and you're so keen; but in the corner of your eye you can see and feel the haters, then the rain starts falling and you think 'maybe I'll start it another day,' the wind picks up and pushes you around and you think 'it's too strong, it's too hard, it's not safe' and you start talking yourself out of it.

You get distracted by the desire to get that buzz, to do something else, to go back to your old ways because it's easier.

Maybe you feel like Jesus. You're the solid person at work, in the family, whose seeing everything being tossed around like rag dolls, but you have the strength to see those who are drowning and you reach out and pick them up. But just remember, in order for Jesus to do all of this, he spent time alone in prayer.

I don't know where you fit into the story. But I know that when Peter sets his eyes upon Jesus and trusts, he's ok. Peter tests God and says "if it's really you, do this." Friends, trust me, making bargains with God is a dangerous business, believe me when I say, God always wins! But Jesus in this situation humours Peter and invites him into this place. Not the sea, but in this place; a place of craziness, a whirlwind of destruction and terror around when everything feels out of control. Yet Jesus is the source of calmness and stillness.

Whether you're the ship, the wind, the disciples, or clinging on to Jesus right now, know this. Jesus is the rock which will not move. Trust in him and he will not let you go, the wind and tempestuous wind will not overcome you. You will not drown in the pile of work you have to do or with the horrific thing you're facing right now. He's got you. Just keep your eyes fixed on him.
