Superintendent Rev'd Dawn **Reflections:**

I found some letters to schools to excuse an absence, they were online, so who knows genuine? Probably not.

"Please excuse Josh for being absent. I forgot to wake him up and I did not find him until I made the beds -- by then it was too late.

"John didn't come to school yesterday because he felt like he was going to be sick. Thankfully, he wasn't!"

"Please excuse Sophie from school. It was Take Your Daughter to Work Day. So I made her stay at home and do housework."

This one is my all-time favourites!

"Please excuse Mary for missing school yesterday. We forgot to pick the Sunday paper off the doormat and when we found it on Monday, we thought it was Sunday."

Do you think we make excuses up for not fulfilling our roles as disciples, not all the time but perhaps when things are tough. Perhaps we aren't always really honest with ourselves about the MAKING depth of our commitment. It is interesting that we might consider it easier to think of ourselves as Christians but find it more challenging to think about ourselves as disciples.

> Here is an interesting fact - the word disciples occurs 269 in the New Testament – The word Christian only 3. - I will leave that with you as I carry on reflecting.

When we explore scriptures, there are so many examples of people called by God - who didn't question or make up excuses for following.

Throughout His life Abraham followed God in faith. He believed what God said about his future. When instructed by the Lord to leave his land, he left it, without even knowing where he was going... he didn't say "I have faith, but I'm staying in Ur". Rather he left his home, his properties, his family and friends, and left... that's faith... with a challenge.

Peter was called to be an apostle, called to change his life, called to serve the Lord Jesus as a witness to God's grace in his life.

Paul's watchword became, "Not I, but Christ". His concern was to be sensitive to the voice of God who had called him.

"And Jesus said to them, "Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And at once they left their nets and followed him." this is the story about the calling of Simon, Andrew. James and John. from the first chapter of Mark.

Matthew's calling, is the slight exception this is not told in the context of the calling of other disciples; instead, it is followed by an example of the kind of life to which he was being called.

Today we heard about Samuel and his first encounter, listening for the voice of God, recognising that God was calling, not Eli.

The other reading from our gospel of John speaks about Philip and Nathaniel being called by Jesus. What faith these examples show us, of taking a journey, walking with God and not always knowing where the path will take us.

That is what faith is in the end. -Faith is a difficult thing to describe we can't see it, hear it, smell it, or taste it and it is ever changing. Our definition of what our faith is, changes as we grow. it isn't a concrete factual thing. But part of it is about setting forth on a journey without knowing the details of what the path will bring but knowing that the one who brings the path to us will do everything that he has promised to do.

Jesus recognized Nathaniel as the one who was sitting under the fig tree. I don't know how many of you, like me, enjoy people watching. I find it fascinating to sit perhaps in a cafe or in the park watching people go about their business, not because I'm nosey, all though I am a bit, but I like to see how people react - you can tell a lot about a person by the way they react to a certain situation. Our human responses are a real give away sometimes anyway to aspects of our personality.

This is also true of our churches, we as a body of people, within and somewhere other people might look to see how we as Christians respond to certain issues or situations. This presents us all with a huge challenge.

Jesus, our example, from Him, flowed healing, wisdom, compassion, caring, vision, hope, and life itself. He called His disciples to continue His work and ministry, and He calls us too. If we are to respond in faith to the circumstances we find ourselves in and with the challenges we face then we must learn to completely trust in God.

Proverbs 3: verse 5 says

Trust in the LORD with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways acknowledge Him, and he will make your paths straight.

It is a daunting responsibility, and we may sometimes feel as though we can never live up to the calling of a disciple. But I find comfort in the fact that the first 12 disciples weren't anywhere near perfect after they'd been chosen their lack of understanding comes up time and time again.

Whilst Jesus was trying to teach them about servant hood they were fighting over who was the best disciple On one of the most important nights of Jesus life in the garden of Gethsemane Peter James and John fell asleep. At the time of the arrest Mark's account says they all deserted him and fled. He was arrested because Judas betrayed him and not long after that Peter denied even knowing him

Lets face it they messed things up quite spectacularly, but Jesus picked C them and he has picked each one of us here too! Yes – a disciple is one who IS gives up everything to follow Jesus – yes a disciple is one who messes up from time to time – but a disciple is also one who is willing to learn and grow and take up the challenges to which we are called. AMEN
