Message (Rev. Nico Hilmy-Jones)

It will be nearly a year since I last saw any of my friends or my son, Patrick, in person. I know for some of us this is our reality and we have not seen people we love for a very long time and perhaps we grieve as we have felt disconnected and just flat from the whole experience and a continuing pandemic that is raging in our world without an end in sight. I am aware that my second attempt at a Sabbatical is looming and I may not be able to go back home to Edinburgh and see the people I love the most and be around places and experiences that bring me peace and that have held me and centred me when I needed to be around something familiar. I can be sad at times and find it difficult to see the blessings and things to be thankful for, because I am human and it hurts to be separated.

But, then I chat with those I love on the phone and occasionally see them on video and for a moment I am connected again and I am aware that my heart is filled in those moments and that in wondrous ways God is with me in those conversations and phone calls, in the text messages, softly saving, see there is good here and those you love are still there. I look at a photo of my son and some of his art work that adorns my walls and it reminds me of his love for me, how he makes me laugh when we talk about silly things, how he shows his love by checking on me and asking if I am okay. when he says how thankful he is that I am safe and I am his mum and that even though we are so far away, we are still ski close and in here. My son holds me at times when I need to be held and so I look at the image of him and think how lucky I am to have him in my life and that he is so good and so loving.

When we look at verse 2 in our Psalm it says: Great are the works of the Lord; they are pondered by all who delight in them. In much the same way I look at a photo of my son and see the love and goodness, God is saying when we look and see God's works, it is like a photo of God and what He does in our lives. The whole reason that God shows His works in nature is for us to see that God is good.

In verse 4 it says: He has caused his wonders to be remembered so the writer of the Psalm is talking about celebrating the presence of God in our lives and how we worship him is our way of remembering and honouring him. From the very first verse where it says: "Praise the Lord!" and it is meant to be a joyous song of praise and seeing the amazing creative works all around us.

The Psalms can be viewed as a book of human emotions in which it showed the Israelites how to approach and receive God in their midst. This means that the attitude in which we conduct worship and even participate in these acts of worship, whether we are together in person or online will make the difference between worshipping God, because that's what we do, and worshipping God, because we want to connect and open our hearts and become transformed and changed people. When we encounter God in a profound and beautiful way, we are responding to God and what He is to us. We are acknowledging that God is important to us and through grateful hearts we are saving to God, we are here, we are ready and we want you to be with us.

God says see the wonders, see that even in these times, I am with you and holding you, even when you falter. He gently prods us to see beyond the mess and to see the things around us and then our praise, our Our Hallelujahs go from being words on our lips to the words of our lives.

Psalm 111 reminds us that our stories intertwine with those of God's people throughout the history of those who came before us and paved the way from the beginning of Exodus and beyond. In faith, we are connected to believers in every time and every place. When we read this Psalm, or any Psalm we are connected with all who believe in God. This Psalm is about focusing on God and God's character, God's actions and God's promises. When it says in verse 3: Glorious and majestic are his deeds, and in verse 9: holy and awesome is his name, the language and meaning is that our God is powerful and transcendent. But, even though God is transcendent and therefore holy and awesome, full of majesty and honour, God is equally and most importantly immanent and close by, because God is gracious and merciful, ever mindful and providing. Even

though Gods works are "great", those works are also faithful and just and trustworthy and God can be known by us.

Verse 10 says this: The fear of the Lord is the beginning of wisdom; all who follow his precepts have good understanding. To him belongs eternal praise. These words are not about being frightened of God, no, they mean see and revere God's redemptive acts in our world and see and remember our Covenant with God and trust that God is good and will provide as he did with the Israelites so long ago. It is this never ending journey of faithful response to God, that is highlighted and is stressed so heavily in the book of Psalms and is central to our faith today.

A United Methodist Bishop Robert Schnase once said this: "Every congregation, large and small, is a tapestry of hope and hurt, a collage of experience and anticipation, a patchwork quilt of gifts, needs, fears and aspirations. People come to connect with God and one another as well as to feel restored, reminded, remembered and refreshed". Psalm 111 is our loving response to all of that.

And so, thanksgiving should mark our time together today, whether you are in your bedroom or your kitchen or your office or living room, and thanksgiving should be part of our lives and an expression of our faith. I am reminded that being thankful in times like this, is seeing that although we are faced with difficult decisions because of regulations and because covid cases are slowly rising on the Island, again, God is a consistent presence in our lives and there are still great blessings amongst us. God is reminding us that he is still very much with us and he is the giver of good gifts and he is constant and never changes.

Where have you seen God this week? Where are the blessings to be found? We see the thread of God's love moving in Food Banks. Moving with people being with someone in their grief, their fear or their anxiety. Moving in charities that tend to those in need. Moving in the compassionate way we acknowledge those around us who feel forgotten. Moving in the phone calls and video chats we have with one another. Moving in our Churches and communities as we reach out to those seeking connection. There are things to be thankful for and blessings

found in the shadows and in the grey places where the love of God lies in wait and is simply seeking a place in which to dwell. Giving thanks to God for what connects us allows us to be held in those times when we falter and our hearts and souls ache, but then for me, I look at a photo of my son and the love that I have for him is the same kind of love that God has for each one of us because we are all beloved children of God. Trust that gratitude and grace go hand in hand. Trust that God is near. Trust that there are pockets of the Kingdom all around us and trust that profound beautiful acts of love and blessing is still to be found, and that our wondrous powerful God is amongst us pointing out all we need to see and hold on to. As one theologian said, 'open to something greater, something better, that lies deeply within even the most ordinary experiences. A life of thanksgiving and hallelujah is "living large."

This Psalm reminds us and encourages each one of us to recognise the silver linings that may be within the hard things because it is there we find the deeper unexpected blessings that God is trying to show us and is always forged with His love.
