It may be that we feel challenged by Jesus' sacrifice because although God's gift of grace in Jesus Christ is a free gift which cannot be earned or bought, in reality, deep down our own heart and conscience tell us that Jesus' sacrifice on the cross demands a response from us, it calls us to repent and believe.

In our gospel passage today Jesus is teaching the difficult truth that we must rely on him for our very life, and about our need to feast on who he is in order that we may have life in all its fullness. When Jesus says "you must drink my blood" he is saying "my life is the life which belongs to God which you must take into the very centre of your heart and being." But people find this difficult, they choose to be offended because the alternative is to believe and to take up their cross to follow Jesus. Jesus' shedding his blood on the cross demands a change of direction from us.

It demands the laying down of worldly ideas and attitudes. It demands that we, like Jesus, seek to serve instead of being served. It demands that we put the needs of others before our own and that we offer our lives as a living sacrifice, that we live lives that are holy and pleasing to God. And although to some all this might sound like foolishness causing them to be offended and turn away, the truth is that it is only when we offer our lives to Jesus and follow his way that we will experience life in all its fullness.

So today in response to Jesus' words "Those wo eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them, " and in response to Jesus' sacrifice on the cross, my question to you is - do you choose to be offended and turn away or do you choose to believe that Jesus has the words of eternal life? Amen.

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Gospel Reading: John 6:56-69

⁵⁶Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me, and I in them. ⁵⁷Just as the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever eats me will live because of me. ⁵⁸ This is the bread that came down from heaven, not like that which your ancestors ate, and they died. But the one who eats this bread will live forever." ⁵⁹ He said these things while he was teaching in the synagogue at Capernaum.

The Words of Eternal Life

⁶⁰ When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This teaching is difficult; who can accept it?" ⁶¹ But Jesus, being aware that his disciples were complaining about it, said to them, "Does this offend you? ⁶² Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before?

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Reflection/Sermon

At the end of John's gospel the gospel writer tells us that the things that he has written are so that we may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God and that through believing we may have life in his name.

And John's gospel is full of examples of people who come to believe and people who don't and here we see in our gospel passage this morning a stark contrast between those disciples who stopped following Jesus and those who made a decision to stick with him.

So what is the difference between those who turned back and those who decided to stay? It is, as Simon Peter says, that those who chose to stay had come to believe and know that Jesus is the Holy One of God. They had come to know that Jesus has the words of eternal life.

But what about those who turn away? Well, there is no doubt that Jesus' words are difficult. He starts by saving "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them." From a 21st century perspective, if understood literally, this smacks of cannibalism and sounds, at best, weird, at worst, repulsive. I have heard people who are unfamiliar with the sacrament of Holy Communion where we share bread and wine say that they felt uncomfortable with some of the language that was used in the sacrament. A Christian friend of mine who did some work in Russia a few years back in Russian schools was questioned by some school children there. And one of the first questions they asked was "Is it true that Christians eat people?"

But Jesus' words would have perhaps been even harder for the people who were present at the time that he spoke them. To this day, no orthodox Jew will eat meat which has not been completely drained of blood. In Jewish thought blood stands for life and blood belongs to God alone. In Genesis chapter 9 verse 4, it says "you shall not eat flesh with its life, that is, its blood." And in Leviticus it says clearly "If anyone of the house of Israel or of the aliens who reside among

them eats any blood, I will set my face against that person who eats blood, and will cut that person off from the people."

So what is Jesus talking about here when he says "Those who eat my flesh and drink my blood abide in me and I in them." Well Leviticus 17:11 continues "For the life of the flesh is in the blood: and I have given it to you for making atonement for your lives on the altar; for, as life, it is the blood that makes atonement."

In talking about his flesh and his blood Jesus is connecting himself to Leviticus 17 and the blood that saves. Jesus is telling the disciples that he will be the sacrifice that leads to eternal life. Later in John's gospel we hear an account of Jesus' crucifixion and it tells us that after Jesus received the wine, he said "It is finished" and then bowed his head and gave us his spirit signalling to the Jewish world that there was no more need for sacrifices or temples because the sacrifice that Jesus made for us on the cross was a once and for all sacrifice. obtaining eternal redemption for us with his blood.

And today there are many people who find that difficult and distasteful to hear. We don't like talk of sacrifice do we? We think of it as a barbaric ritual that belongs to another era and civilization. But sacrifice can also mean willingly giving something up for somebody else or for the greater good. John's gospel makes clear that Jesus willingly gave up his life for us. When they came to arrest

him in the Garden of Gethsemane Jesus said "Do you think that I cannot appeal to my Father, and he will at once send me more that twelve legions of angels?"

But Jesus didn't appeal to his Father and yes God allowed Jesus' crucifixion to happen as part of his plan to rescue humanity but it wasn't God who killed Jesus, it was sinful human beings. In humility during his ministry Jesus healed the sick and comforted the broken and the lost and yet the religious leaders of the day, human beings like you and me, had Jesus killed because he posed a challenge to their 'religion' and their understanding of the ways thing should be.

And yet on the cross, what does Jesus say? He says "Father, forgive them; for they do not know what they are doing." This is God's outrageous love for us. Even when we do our worst, God still loves us and God offers us a fresh start; he offers us new life in the life of Jesus who God raised from the dead.

When confronted with the risen Jesus and the scandal of God's amazing and self-giving love, we face a profound tension that will lead either to offence or belief. Many people find it hard to accept that someone would willingly lay down their life for them and endure such suffering and brutality, why would they? No-one loves anyone else that much surely? Or it may be that we are offended because we don't believe that we are in need of a Saviour. We don't want to admit that somewhere deep down within us there is a longing that
