Reflection by Rev Tony Morling

The other day I was loading the weekly shopping in the car when I remembered the words: 'Don't forget the fish fingers'. It was 8.00pm and there was no queue, so as I made my way to the freezer department my eye noticed the cut price Easter egg sale. There were significant reductions and then the manager said, 'If you know some key-workers take some'. Before I knew it he handed me a carrier bag full of mini-eggs which I then distributed to key-workers the next day. They were delighted!

That will be one of my best memories of this time- a store manager reaching out to people he does not know with a generous action of solidarity.

Islanders who experienced the war- both those that were evacuated and those not, often recall similar actions of solidarity. Against the backdrop of curfews, rationing and absence from loved ones, they remember that Red Cross letter, the neighbours sharing a little sugar and of course those brown cardboard boxes that arrived on the Vega- which even contained some chocolate!

The occupation brought suffering and separation: over 300 islanders were taken from Jersey to concentration camps and prisons, and not all returned. But those memories are intermingled with stories of kindness, courage and solidarity.

St Paul, writing to the church at Philippi knew that it is possible to allow the mind to brood on the hurts of the past and allow that corrosive energy to be re-cycled. Instead he seems to say, 'Grab the good, and keep reminding yourself of all that is good, and the Peace of God will be with you'.

'Brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable—if anything is excellent or praiseworthy—think about such things'.

That could not have been easy for him as he wrote as a chained prisoner, probably awaiting execution. In the toughest of times St Paul when he was most aware of his vulnerability, still counted his blessings- and his freedom in Christ.

The war years were the defining experience of our island in the last century, and while the restrictions of movement and contact we face today bear no comparison to the occupation- we do have an opportunity to reflect on what is really important and what makes us free.

For some, freedom has required the courage to forge twinning friendships with towns such as Bad Wurzach in Germany so that our future is not limited by the past.

For others, freedom brings a commitment to practical service to others in politics, volunteering, career choice or caring for neighbours through their churches.

For many, there continues to be a ring of truth that in God, in Jesus- we find our ultimate freedom. It begins in receiving a free gift, an act of kindness on the cross, that all may know 'life, and life in all it fullness'. This is the ultimate freedom- an inner peace irrespective of circumstances. St Paul discovered it, as he lingered in that Roman jail. It is also our free gift today.

George Appleton put it like this: 'Freedom in Christ is not freedom to do what I like, but freedom to be what I am meant to be. It is freedom from all the chains which hold me back from being my true self. It is freedom from all imposed limitations and external pressures. It is to share in Christ's freedom to do God's will, and then to help others find a similar freedom'.

On this poignant Liberation day, can I invite you: Though confined to your home to pause, give thanks, and say, 'I am Free'.

Although we are restricted to use boats or planes to move to others in generous acts of kindness and solidarity to show that we are Free.

Though this awful disease renders havoc across the world- even now, to count our Blessings, and give 'Thanks to God for the Freedom that Christ brings'.

And by the way, I was so distracted by the gift of chocolates I returned home without the fish fingers! Never mind, what I did carry was a memory of unexpected kindness for our key-workers- and for that, I am thankful.

A moment of quiet within which we silently give thanks for all the freedoms we enjoy today.
