### Message

"My Burden is Light"

Many of you know, my husband is a pilot. Correction, he was a pilot until Covid 19 broke out. There are many legends in the aviation industry but my favourite story goes like this...

Cow falling into a boat.

When Paul was flying, he flew cargo. The best kept secret in aviation, cargo's not late, it's not drunk and it doesn't talk back. But the one thing that fascinated me about his flying cargo was there was always a load master. Someone who made sure that the load in an areoplane was just right, so that formula 1 cars don't roll around, the Roses for M&S didn't get squashed and race horse pens stay put.



I love a bit of Greek, and so when I was reading the passage today from

Matthew and we came across this beautiful and well known verse, "Come to me all who are weary and heavy laden, I will give you rest," I thought, I wonder if the Greek can shed some new light into this passage, and well it does. Two things that blew my mind.

1. The word that is often translated as weary. What does this mean to you? What images does it conjure up? For me, I think of myself after a long Guide camp and I come home and I'm exhausted. I think of some of the times when I've had a long day of meetings, funerals, visits and still forgot to buy milk on the way home so I can't even have a cup of tea. But the Greek word means something so much more. Something a lot stronger than just worn out. The dictionary definition of the word "Kopiontes" often translated as carrying a laden, or weary, means this

It comes from the word Kopos, "a beating, a beating of the breast with grief, sorrow, labour or trouble.
To cause one trouble, to make extra work for them."

Suddenly, this word Kopos reminds me of the times when I've been at my wits end, the times when I've been nearly broken with the weight of work, stress, personal trouble, family trouble, you fill in the blank.

And the Greek gets worse. In Matthew's gospel, It doesn't just use the word Kopos, it makes it into a particple (If you don't know anything about grammar, that's fine, but trust me when I say, participles are not your friend.) Kopiontes What turning it into a participle does, is makes it into an active thing, it's ongoing, it's not a one off, this participle is in it for the long run. So what does this mean for our translation? Well, how about this.

It means that the weight you're carrying, isn't a one off weight, it's something you've been carrying for a long time. Kopos is a nasty email you've opened and ruins your day. Kopiontes. Means receiving that nasty email every day, every hour, it's cyber bullying you hear on facebook etc. Kopos is something you can probably deal with and get back on your feet. Kopiontes is relentless.

Can you think of a time when you were feeling like that beating down of your soul, work, life, spirit was never ending and it felt like there was no light at the end of the tunnel? That's Kopiontes. And that's what Jesus is referring to. If you feel like this, Jesus says, you need to pay attention to what I'm saying.

2. There were two interesting things about the Greek here. This is the second.

For-tid-zo. Usually translated as burden, or laden. It means to load up properly, as a vessel or animal; or figuratively to overburden with ceremony or spiritual anxiety.

Honestly, Jesus is a genius. He uses this play on words so much in Greek and is often lost in the English translation. Jesus talks about the burden that we're facing in our day to day lives but also in our spiritual lives.

I'm reminded of Paul and his cargo plane with this Greek work Fortidzo, imagining load masters strapping down whatever they are carrying into the plane and making sure that the weight is all in the right place to make the plane safe. And I can imagine First Century Palestinians doing the same with their Ox and Donkeys, making sure that the load was distributed evenly and that their animal could still do the work.

So what does this mean for you. What's on your shoulders at the minute? Is it spaced out evenly so that you can actually do your work and get on with your life and thrive? Or is it unevenly balanced and you can't get up the hill because the weight is dragging you down. Perhaps there's so much, you can't even get going.

Jesus was no stranger to antagonizing the religious authorities and when he uses this word, he's having a side swipe at them when he says pretty much, 'are you Templed out? Are you Synagagoued out? Are you so weary, so Kopiontes with church responsibilities and expectations and everything else that vou can't get going let alone get up the hill. He says, the load I'm going to give you is easy, what I ask you to carry is doable and manageable and what I ask you to do will change your life. Jesus doesn't say there won't be trouble and it won't be hard, after all, Jesus later goes on to say 'take up vour cross...'

But the point I take away from this Greek play on words is this, faith, religion, church, should not be a burden. It should not be a Kopiontes. For many of us, this pandemic has caused us to stop, be still and put down our burdens of church rotas, activities and other things. We've been forced to have a break and consider becoming Mary's and not Martha's.

The two Greek words compliment each other and make sense.
Are you feeling like a Kopiontes?
With whatever is going on in your life? Do you feel like the work load and pressure on your back is overloaded and you can't carry on, or even worse, the cows are about to

break free and cause havoc everywhere?

Trust me when I say. Listen to the words of Jesus. He knows your heart, he knows your trouble and this weight that you're carrying, you don't need to let it dominate your life.

There is rest, and it's found in God.

We pray for people everywhere carrying so much pain and do not know who to turn to for help. For those amongst us who are afraid and unsure and live on the fringe of our


communities and Churches. May they know that they matter and may we, as your children and Churches, shine our lights so they know we are a place of haven and love. Use us as instruments of hope, Lord.

for it lifts me up to thee.


