
Lord, we come into your awesome presence, from the shadows into your radiance. May the light of your presence guide our worship today. Amen .

As we gather to praise you for all that you are and all that you bring, we pray; 'mirrored here, may our lives tell your story' today and every day. Amen.


# **Prayer of Confession**

Lord we acknowledge that there have been times when we have not shared the riches of your kingdom with others.

Times when we have taken the easy route, choosing options that require less time, less energy, less thought.

Times when we have turned back to the ways of the world, that are contrary to the values of your kingdom. - And in a moment of quiet we bring into your light our own personal confessions.

Lord, we remember you are a God of mercy and grace, who forgives us and transforms us, by the power of your Spirit, into the people you have truly made us to be. **Amen**. **Today's NT Reading: Acts 7:54-8:4** When the members of the Sanhedrin heard this, they were furious and gnashed their teeth at him. But Stephen, full of the Holy Spirit, looked up to heaven and saw the glory of God, and Jesus standing at the right hand of God. "Look," he said, "I see heaven open and the Son of Man standing at the right hand of God."



At this they covered their ears and, yelling at the top of their voices, they all rushed at him, dragged him out of the city and began to stone him. Meanwhile, the witnesses laid their coats at the feet of a young man named Saul.

While they were stoning him, Stephen prayed, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then he fell on his knees and cried out, "Lord, do not hold this sin against them." When he had said this, he fell asleep.

And Saul approved of their killing him. On that day a great persecution broke out against the church in Jerusalem, and all except the apostles were scattered throughout Judea and Samaria.

Time to Reflect:-

## 'Those who had been scattered preached the word wherever they went'.

John Wesley once said, "I love a commodious room, a soft cushion, a handsome pulpit". However, opposition to his radical preaching meant that the handsome pulpits of 18th century England were no longer accessible to him.

On April 2nd, 1739, he recorded in his journal the first time he preached outside the confines of the building, "at four in the afternoon I submitted to be more vile, and proclaimed in the highways the glad tidings of salvation..."

The paradox is that the Methodist revival really got going after Wesley faced the disaster of being barred from speaking in church buildings and stepped into the market place where he could be overheard by all. Similarly, the early church in Jerusalem began to fulfil their calling to preach to all nations after the horror of Stephen's killing in Acts 8:4.



Both of these great movements of God were breathed into life because Christians faced events that they did not want or choose, but to which they responded with courage and faith. History teaches us that Wesley discovered profound benefits as he preached outside the building, as did the early Christians, 'wherever they went'.

My Dad used to say, 'It's an ill wind that blows no good'. By that, I think he meant that there is nearly always some good in the most difficult of situations. St Paul, would write to the church in Rome, "that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are the called according to His purpose."

This week the cross has been replaced on the steeple of St Thomas's. The cross is the ultimate reminder that after the horror of the cross comes the empty tomb, after Good Friday there is Easter Day. The cross stands tall declaring amidst suffering there is always hope, always blessing.

So I have been asking people whether they can identify any benefits from this awful, unwelcome pandemic. Despite the many lives lost, the disruption to incomes and jobs and confinement to our homes, are there God-given blessings that people discern? The responses have been heartwarming and encouraging. They include:

I'll never take for granted the dedication and skills of essential services that care for all in our community. Cheering on a Thursday night was so special.

I know my neighbours so much better and had real conversations with them about faith.

I've really had to rely on God. I've spent more time reading my bible and praying.

Now that I'm dipping my toes back into worship, I like reading the hymns, shorter sermons, but missing the chat over coffee!

My church has shown that it can adapt and change to new circumstances. I have a new sense of belonging to the Circuit.

The church has been open even though the building has been closed. It has made me think about being part of a gathered church and a scattered church.

It's the first time that I have really benefited from digital communications. The on-line services have helped me to worship with others on a Sunday. It has made me realise that I can make a difference by telephoning someone up and asking how they are.

Perhaps you too can identify some blessings amidst the storm? Can I suggest that we start to make a note of them? This week we have seen a glimmer of hope with the possibility of a vaccine.

That is still a way off, but now is the time to remember all that God is teaching us amidst this crisis.



These God given gems of wisdom may be the truths that will help guide us all in the future. That was the case for John Wesley and the very early church. And it may be true for us too.
