#### Gill – Bible Reading – John 17:6-19

6 "I have revealed you to those whom you gave me out of the world. They were yours; you gave them to me and they have obeyed your word. 7 Now they know that everything you have given me comes from you. 8 For I gave them the words you gave me and they accepted them. They knew with certainty that I came from you, and they believed that you sent me. 9 I pray for them. I am not praying for the world, but for those you have given me, for they are yours.

Love Maria Willis (nee Whitcomb) (1824-1908), Samuel Longfellow (1819-1892) Sermon: Deacon Sally Wheadon I read recently that how we pray and what we pray for reveals a lot about the kind of people we are. I've never considered that before, but actually it is true isn't it. Our prayers reveal a lot about our life, our relationships, our world views and our priorities and concerns. Our prayers also reveal a lot about, not only what we believe about God, but also a lot about our relationship with God.

And in today's Gospel passage, we have the privilege of learning something about the way Jesus prayed and what his concerns and priorities were. Firstly, thinking of how to pray, we see that Jesus' prayer is not simply a wish or shopping list, his prayer is very much a conversation with his heavenly Father. Secondly, even though Jesus is about to face a trial which he knows will lead to an agonizing and humiliating death, his primary concern is not for himself, but for his disciples. And it might appear in this passage that Jesus is praying only for the eleven disciples whom he had called to follow him at the very start of his ministry, with Judas had already left during supper. However, in verse 20 it becomes clear that Jesus is not only praying for the eleven, but also those who will come to believe in

him through their word and that includes you and me. How awesome is that? On the night before he died, Jesus was praying to his heavenly Father for you and for me and his prayer reveals his love, loyalty and commitment to us. So what does Jesus pray for us?

Well, essentially, his prayer reveals that, just as the Father sent him into the world, Jesus sends his disciples into the world, and, in the light of this, he prays for our protection and our sanctification.

So firstly, why do we need protecting? Because Jesus knows that the world is a dangerous place. As he prays he knows that he is about to be crucified and that if the world hated him, it will hate his disciples also. But even so, in this prayer, perhaps Jesus is not as concerned with our physical protection as the protection of our hearts. Note that Jesus asks that we be protected by the power of God's name, the name that Jesus makes known to us. In the Hebrew Scriptures, a name was not simply a label by which to call someone but it carried with it, a person's presence, characteristics, gualities and attributes. Jesus asks for us to be protected by the attributes of his heavenly Father, attributes such as love, mercy, forgiveness, compassion, justice, beauty,

generosity and, not least, unity. Jesus prays for protection for us in God's name that we may be one just as he and his heavenly Father are one. The relationship of Jesus and his heavenly Father is one of love, intimacy, giving, mutual respect and dignity. And that's what Jesus is praying for us as his disciples, that we may be one body, holy and set apart, our hearts filled with and displaying the very life and attributes of God. And being brutally honest here, there is no prayer that Jesus has prayed which has been so hindered from being answered by individual Christians and by the Churches than this. You see, where there are divisions, where there is exclusiveness, where there is competition between the Churches, the cause of Christianity is harmed and Jesus' prayer remains unanswered. The gospel cannot be truly preached and the world cannot be evangelized by competing churches. Every time a church divides, it is another tear in the fabric of the body of Christ. The Apostle Paul is very realistic about our human frailty and acknowledges that there will be differences of opinion within the church, but what he urges of the Christians in Rome applies still to us today. He says "Let us therefore no longer pass

judgement on one another, but resolve instead never to put a stumbling-block or hindrance in the way of another." Paul was aware that Christian unity is of the upmost importance for the kingdom of God to prevail.

#### Turning now to sanctification.

Jesus prays for us to be sanctified in the truth. But what does sanctification really mean? When we use such words, I'm guessing that most people outside of the church have no clue as to what we're talking about and, perhaps, many inside the church too. Well, according to the dictionary sanctification literally means 'to be set apart for special use or purpose,' it then goes on to say 'to make sacred or holy.' You see, Jesus is sending us into the world, not to be a part of it, but to model a different way of being within it. When Jesus talks about the world, he's not talking about a physical place or creation, he's talking about the many different operating systems that are used to order society and that we have come to accept as 'just the way it has to be.' Often we ask ourselves "what else can we do?" even when the operating systems of the world perpetuate fear, anger, division, injustice, oppression and greed. This is the world into which

Jesus sent his disciples and it remains the world in which we live and practice our faith today. Jesus knows that the human ordering of life is often contrary and opposed to God's ordering of it. And so he prays for us to be protected and sanctified as we continue his life and work within the world. His prayer is for us not to be removed from the world, but to live within it according to God's operating system; he calls us to reveal God's love, mercy, forgiveness, beauty, wisdom and generosity in the world. But why? Because John 3:16 and 17 tells us that God loves the world, so much so that he sent his only Son, not to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him.

But let's be honest, it isn't easy to extract ourselves from the world's operating systems, many would willingly buy ethically sourced products but cannot because they themselves are the victims of injustice and greed leaving them with little with which to feed themselves and their families. But where we can and whenever we can, we are called to make a difference. In large part, we are the answer to Jesus' prayer. As we live out our lives in the world, we are called to offer forgiveness rather than retribution, mercy instead of

condemnation. We are called to see life through the lens of beauty rather than cynicism, to choose unity over individualism and God's ways over personal agendas. As I say, it isn't always easy, but in those moments when we do these things, we are the 'amen' to Jesus' prayer, our hearts are healed and the world is a different place.
