A weekend of celebration

With 2025 marking 250 years of Methodism in the island, the Circuit chose the weekend of the 26th and 27th of April to celebrate this momentous milestone. 

Sunday 27th April - First Methodists History Walk



A one-hour gentle walk through St Helier took place on Sunday the 27th, with the purpose of exploring the lives of the early Methodists in the island. Blue Badge Guide, Jean Treleven, lead the walk through and had the following thoughts after the walk:

"It was a real pleasure to share 250 years of Methodism in Jersey with our President and Vice-President and members of our churches. It is a story that not only gives context to Methodism today but also to our

island heritage - the desire for change following the reformation, the recognition by a few cod fishermen of what John Wesley offered and the impact his teaching had on all aspects of life in Jersey.



The story was told through significant locations such as the early harbour, the town church, Hill street, the Royal Square where Wesley preached, the Methodist run Joint Stock Bank, the prison holding Methodists who refused to drill on Sundays, Old Street and the early chapels."





Sunday 27th -Celebration Service & Afternoon Tea

All were welcomed to join in a circuit service of celebration on Sunday the 27th of April at St Helier Methodist Church.

Starting at 3pm, and lead by the President and Vice-President of the Conference, the congregation were welcomed to take their seats whilst the Circuit choir (organised specially and lead by Libby Farnon) filled the space with music and song.
